Friends, supporters and volunteers joined the directors of the Loch Lomond Steamship Company on 5.3.23 to celebrate 70 years since PS Maid of the Loch was launched from the Balloch Pier on Loch Lomond on 5.3.53



The busy event included a presentation of talks and sharing great stories and memories from over the last 70 years. Attendees ended the occasion by raising their

glasses for a toast after the birthday cake was cut by two of our longest serving volunteers -Hamish Teaze and Charles Inglis.

PADDLE PROGRESS



A small team led by volunteer Robert Cudahy is progressing well on preparing the components of the paddles for assembly.

A complex system of levers, brackets, arms, rods and swivel bearings all form part of the Jenny Nettles, the mechanism which adjusts the angles of the floats as the paddle wheels turn so they enter the water smoothly and are vertical when in the water for maximum leverage.

Components are held together by pins which are bolted tightly in the

brackets and arms and a system of bronze sleeves, plastic bushes and spacers makes the paddle floats swivel as the paddles turn.

The team are currently trial fitting as many of these components as possible inside the dining room and making adjustments as needed to make them fit correctly.



Many of the parts are the originals from when the ship was built and have suffered wear and corrosion which makes them all slightly different. Every part and sub assembly is measured and identified so when full paddle assembly starts we know exactly which components go together. Once the smaller parts are finished the work will move outside on to the larger components as the weather improves.

VOLUNTEER FOCUS

GEORGE MCVICAR - MAID VOLUNTEER

George is a retired Civil Engineer, latterly working for Scottish Water as an Estimator until 2015. Prior to that he was a Resident Engineer on Water and Sewerage projects with Strathclyde Region and overseas in the Middle East.

He is a "Son of the Rock" and season ticket holder for Dumbarton FC (who celebrate their 150th Anniversary this year, a good few years more than the Maid), and enjoys music, attending festivals and gigs.

George told us, "I like to cycle, and one of my favourite routes is from Dumbarton to Balloch Pier, where I could enjoy a coffee from the pier café. On one visit, someone appeared wearing a boiler suit and we got chatting. He explained that he was working to restore the Maid, with a view to getting her sailing again.

I had no idea that this work was ongoing, and as I'd spent many happy hours ski-ing on Loch Lomond, and had fond memories of being on the Maid, I signed up as a volunteer. I was fortunate to have started just a couple of weeks before the engines ran for the first time for 38 years, in September 2019.

The engine was powered from an on shore boiler, and when the engine first turned it was like a sauna as there was so much steam. I'm sure that wasn't the only reason for so many wet eyes amongst the long-time volunteers.

One of my first jobs was to stop the leaks by replacing the packing around the glands, and although I'd some mechanical engineering experience, it was the first time I'd really used a spanner in earnest. I was very much the

apprentice. The only consolation was that I wasn't sent for "a bubble for a spirit level", or "a long ston", the usual apprentice's fate!

When the ship was moved onto the newly built cradle, I was involved in dismantling the Port side paddle floats and brackets, which was a major operation, taking over 5 months, and was a very steep learning curve for even the most experienced Engineers. In comparison, dismantling the Starboard floats and bracket took less than half the time once procedures had been established and perfected.

I also helped in the dismantling and removal of the boiler room pipework, internal metalwork, and sections of the hull, prior to the contracted marine engineers, installing the new sections of hull.

Most recently I've been helping build the new paddle floats, and preparation and painting of the starboard paddle.

I've learned so much, it's been a terrific experience, working with a great bunch of volunteers, and I'd e n c o u r a g e anyone who is looking for a fulfilling project to get involved."


the meeting by reading a telegram from McCallum urging the preservation of "The Maid of the Loch."

The Loch Lomond Steamship Company treated their hardworking volunteers to a day trip to Fairfield Museum in Govan. Thanks to the Scottish Community Alliance for helping with the travel and sustenance costs.

Fairfield Heritage is a community museum dedicated to telling the story of Govan's role in world shipbuilding. Many of the volunteers at PS Maid of the Loch have a connection to shipbuilding and Fairfield. One of our engineers served his apprenticeship there and others had parents or grandparents who were also employed there. Charli Summers ,The Programme Manager met with Abigail Morris and the museum volunteers in 2021 when Charli was researching collections for our newly built slipway museum and she thought that it would be a good community and learning event for the volunteers.

Fairfield Shipbuilding & Engineering Company Ltd, in the late 19th and early 20th centuries revolutionised sea transportation, building the largest and fastest vessels the world had

ever seen. The permanent collections and special exhibitions on display are of interest to our volunteers and the visit included looking at the history of the Clyde where PS Maid of the Loch was built in the early 1950s.

Many of the volunteers at both community museums have a shared interest and history and it was also an opportunity to share stories of both the Maid and Fairfield.
